- Focus on two main areas
  - Treaty monitoring and law enforcement through satellite Earth observation
  - 2. Privacy conflicts from high resolution imaging

### 1. Monitoring & enforcement

- Potential EO extends applications
  - New issues as consequence of VHR
  - Interaction with UAV & ground data intensified
  - ▶ Better access to archived data & public awareness → effectiveness as deterrent!
    - Many examples by now: USA, EU & individual EU member states, Australia, India, ICJ
- Optimisation legal & regulatory framework for satellite EO required





# Monitoring etc. – ctd.

- GMES can contribute greatly
  - WMD proliferation treaties
  - Critical infrastructure & borders
  - Terrorism
  - Drug trafficking; illegal logging
  - Mass-migration
- On national level: German Sat Data
   Security Act (only): EU version needed





# Monitoring etc. – ctd.

- Law enforcement
  - Sat data so far used in 'adversarial context'
  - Need for expert witnesses & audit trails
- Privacy not much of an issue yet, but that can change rapidly
- Charter on Space & Major Disasters
  - Raises issues of territorial sovereignty (...!)
  - Liability claims cannot be excluded (!)





# Monitoring etc. – ctd.

- Treaty monitoring in 4 areas
  - 1. Disarmament & arms control
  - 2. Environment
  - 3. International conflicts & peace
  - 4. Human rights
  - Each carrying their own requirements
  - Usually limited to monitoring, no real international sanctioning possible





### 2. Privacy conflicts

- Definition 'privacy'
  - Hinges on lack explicit / implicit approval person concerned
  - Laws & regulations on protection privacy should be clear, consistent & technology-neutral
- Legal concepts defending privacy
  - Trespass (esp. common law)
  - Tort liability & nuisance
  - Confidentiality & data protection





### Privacy conflicts – ctd.

- Privacy as human right
- Privacy versus freedom of information
  - Also: use of information to protect democracy & prevailing of justice
  - → Vague & fluid concept
  - USA: privacy as element of liberty from government interference
  - Europe: protecting people from having lives exposed in mass-media



### Round table

- Recommendations on wide range of legal aspects use of sat data
  - Capacity building on use sat data in context of law enforcement & disaster management
  - Incorporation sat data in relevant int'l legal instruments
  - Development common principles on privacy applicable to remote sensing activities
